Summary

This dataset contains a collection of migration-related sentences extracted from Portuguese political party manifestos from the 2011, 2015, and 2019 legislative elections. Each entry includes the original sentence in Portuguese, sentiment analysis scores (positive, negative, and neutral probabilities), and the migration-related term that appears in the sentence. The sentiment analysis was performed using a multilingual BERT model trained for sentiment classification.

What We Offer

- **Data:** A focused collection of political discourse across three key Portuguese legislative elections curated for migration-related discourse.
- **Sentiment Scores:** Probabilities for positive, negative, and neutral sentiments for each extracted sentence, analyzed via a multilingual BERT model.
- **Contextual Insight:** Supports the computational analysis of political communication regarding migration issues and changing political landscapes.

Key Features

- **Longitudinal Coverage:** Spans election years 2011, 2015, and 2019.
- **Focused Semantic Extraction:** Sentences selected based on a comprehensive list of migration-related terms.
- **Ready-to-Use Format:** Provided in an easily accessible Excel format (sentiment_analysis.xlsx).
